I would hope that ALL 2+2's sell for top dollar. Frankly, for too long these cars have not garnered the kind of respect in the marketplace that they deserve. Throw a big block engine in any Chevy and watch the price skyrocket. Restore a 2-door version of a Plymouth/Dodge taxicab and cash in. The mid-60's $421 / 428$ equipped $2+2$ 's have great styling \& performance. Just compare the interiors to that on cars in their peer group. Carry the front bumper of a Pontiac around around a flea market - that's a man's bumper (queue the Tool Time "hoo, hoo, hoo"). The front bumper on a top-of-the-line 1965 SS Impala is composed of multiple wimpy stampings, assembled like a jigsaw puzzle.

So let's all be gratified when we see a $2+2$ sell for all the money. Higher values = more respect. Higher values result in the conservation of more cars (you don't see \$50,000 cars headed to the crusher). More cars being restored means more manufacturers making more reproduction parts. It's all good. Some would say that as the cars rise in value, the "average guy" can no longer afford one. Well, if they aren't valued highly, they won't survive for the average guy to buy. Granted, I have difficulty being objective about $2+2$ 's, but if I'm correct, and with collectible car prices being down across the board anyway, now is the time to buy. You'll get a lot of car for the money comfortable to drive, quicker than an equivalent GTO. Chances are you'll have the only $2+2$ at the local cruise night, too.
